City Council Update



Tucker's Mayor and Council held two regular meetings in the month of November. The following items were approved:

The consent agenda consisting of the previous month's minutes, a lighting agreement with the Georgia Department of Transportation and the adoption of the DeKalb County Hazard Mitigation Plan. Details can be found in the packet online.

An ordinance to amend the official zoning map for the City relating to identified properties along Lawrenceville Highway between Cooledge and Brockett Roads.

A text amendment to Chapter 46 Zoning to the City code, including changes to adult entertainment establishment regulations.

Approval of six contracts for landscaping, design projects and stormwater issues, the most exciting being the creation of a new part-time position in partnership with the DeKalb Community Service Board for a caseworker to serve as a dedicated resource to the City and to address the needs of unhoused individuals.

Contract approval for the Juliette Road Resurfacing and Safety Improvements Project.

Contract approval for the E. Ponce de Leon Avenue Sidewalk Project.

A resolution of the City Council of Tucker to authorize the city attorney to acquire one part of one parcel of commercial property to redesign Richardson Street.

During the meeting on November 27, the Mayor announced his nomination of John McHenry as the City's second city manager. John has been a member of Team Tucker since the City's inception and is delighted to be considered. Council will vote confirmation at the December 11 meeting.

The City of Tucker Mayor and Council meet on the second and fourth Mondays of each month at Tucker City Hall located at 1975 Lakeside Parkway, Suite 350B, Tucker, GA 30084.

If you are reading this article, I need you to **immediately** send me your bank account information. Your finances have been analyzed and it was discovered that you have an excessive amount of money in your bank. Please send me your account number, password, and location of your bank **right away!** If you do not provide this information, a warrant will be drawn up for your arrest. If you want to avoid going to jail, you can go to any Walmart, Target, or my personal favorite, Costco, and purchase gift cards with all your excess money.

Does this sound ridiculous to you? Sadly, a good number of individuals - including smart people like you - are falling for this type of scam. These scams often start off with a telephone call from someone claiming to be an official with the Internal Revenue Service, the Social Security Administration, the FBI, and even state and local law enforcement agencies. The scam callers start off polite but assertive – stating that you have failed to pay your taxes, failed to answer a jury summons, or perhaps failed to pay your power bill. While the variations of these pretextual calls are too numerous to list, most of these scam calls have one thing in common – the need to send money to the caller or a third party as soon as possible.

Oftentimes, the calls come with a threat of some type. If you don't provide your financial information or a gift card number immediately, the caller threatens to have your electricity shut off or worse, have you arrested and thrown in jail. These criminal scammers, which is what they are, are good at convincing individuals that the reason they are calling is legitimate and extremely urgent. However, when questioned, these callers will refuse to send you any written documentation or provide any credible proof of who they are or the "agency" they are representing.

Perhaps you have received a different type of call, one that begins with the news that you have won the "lottery" or some type of cash prize. The caller, polite but authoritative, tells you that he or she will help you get your fortune if you immediately go to a local store and purchase gift cards for them or provide the caller with your banking information. Just recently, I was flagged down by "Jim" as I was patrolling his neighborhood. Jim - aged 91 - asked if I would meet him nearby and on standby as he delivered some gift cards to an individual he had met over the phone. According to Jim, the individual had contacted him a few weeks prior letting him know that he had won a great amount of money. Sadly, Jim had already purchased thousands of dollars in gift cards and provided the card numbers to the scammer. Later that morning, I called the scammer and introduced myself. After I began asking a few questions, the scammer said something about my mother (may she rest in peace!) and hung up.

What can you do to avoid these scams? First, add your name to the Do Not Call Registry (www.donotcall.gov). Second, educate yourself about the various types of telephone scams that are out there. There are many websites that offer great advice on how to recognize and avoid these scammers (www. consumer.georgia.gov and www.ftc.gov). A simple internet search on "scam calls" can also be helpful. I particularly liked this article on the Georgia Attorney General's website: "Carr Warns of Bogus Spoofed Phone Calls from Scammers Posing as Law Enforcement Officials".

In the end, I am a genuine law enforcement officer, I would never ask for your bank account number, direct payment for a traffic ticket or any other type of renumeration on-thespot, nor would I ever threaten to take you to jail if you didn't immediately pay a fine. Please be very careful when giving out your financial or other personal information, especially over the telephone. If you have a senior citizen in your family, also remind them of the dangers that are out there. Finally, if you are still feeling charitable after reading this article, come join us for coffee at one of the various restaurants around the city...

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With the holidays approaching, most of us want to end the year helping those people and organizations that are important to us. If you get contacted by an organization that claims to be supporting "law enforcement", the "fire department", or "public safety", be curious and ask the caller questions such as "How much of the money you raise goes directly to helping the police officers/fire personnel, etc."? Before you give to these organizations, please also do your research. Websites such as the Better Business Bureau (bbb.org) and Charity Navigator (charitynavigator.org) can be very helpful in determining whether these are legitimate organizations. Happy Holidays!

BUSINESS BOOM

Even before the Halloween candy is on clearance, scads of marketing and advertising campaigns have hit the media, and retailers have put out the decorations for the next big sales rush. Yes, it's that time again: The holiday shopping season is upon us.

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According to the National Retail Federation, November and December can make up as much as 40 percent of a small business's annual revenue. Yet, many small businesses are still struggling to bring operations and earnings back to prepandemic levels as they reopen.

In 2010, American Express (AE) launched the Shop Small® marketing initiative to bring attention to and to encourage people to shop small and locally- owned/operated businesses year-round and particularly during the holidays.

"We want shoppers to support the small businesses we know and love that are the backbone of this community. It's important for businesses in Tucker and all around the country," said Tucker Mayor Frank Auman.

Small business in Tucker offers so much more than retail in the conventional sense. It's home to a variety of products and services such as nail and hair salons, spas, antiques, furniture, vintage clothing, custom engraving, dining, and so much more.

During the November 13 City Council meeting, the mayor issued a formal proclamation recognizing November 25, 2023 as Small Business Saturday® -- another component of the AE marketing initiative – and he encouraged support for Tucker's businesses this holiday season and beyond. "It's time when the residents can make a concerted effort to come out and intentionally support Tucker's small business community," said Auman.

Sure, it's easy and convenient to click your way through Amazon.com or big box e-commerce site, but there's no denying you're not going to get an environmental experience as you would going to a mom-and-pop store or small retail store. If you still prefer online shopping, many local merchants offer e-commerce shopping as well. Check it out before heading to you know where dot com.

And, according to the United States Small Business Administration, when shoppers spend \$100 at a small business approximately \$48 of that stays within the community, spend the same \$100 at a big box store or a national retailer and only \$14 stays local. Small businesses also bring new jobs and generally hire local talent.

Admittedly, shopping local and small may require more thought for most of us. But the reward may be finding some hidden gems right in our own backyard and gift-giving ideas that you may not have even considered.

Supporting local small businesses for most of us requires an intentional act; one that small businesses in our Tucker community need to stay afloat.

So, plan ahead and shop intentionally at locally owned small businesses. "And supporting local doesn't need to end after the holiday season. Let's keep doing so all year long," said Auman.
