From the Mayor:

Mr. Rogers is well known for having said, "Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping." That comforting bit of advice for those in need has been used, mis-used, and over-used, but one place where it will always be true is in Tucker. And as the Mayor, I can tell you that every time we put out the call, Tucker answers.

In the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, the federal government provided relief to Americans via the CARES Act. They did that by providing money to local governments like Tucker's, and we turned to our community for help. We partnered with third parties to get help to our residents and small businesses that were hit hard by the economic effects of sheltering in place, loss of childcare, schools closing their doors and loss of jobs. These local agencies and volunteers included NETworks Cooperative Ministries, Rehoboth Baptist Church, St. Andrews Presbyterian, Georgia Grown, and others, to provide assistance with rent and utilities, food, remote learning, masks, and a range of other needs.

In 2021, the federal government again turned to local governments for help, this time through the American Rescue Plan, and we are turning to our community. ARPA, as it's called, is intended not only to help local governments give continued aid to their residents, but also to address a variety of infrastructure needs to help if and when we should be faced with a similar pandemic or other emergency in the future. It calls for spending on items like green spaces, water and sewer infrastructure, broadband availability, and similar resources to be available for the public during such times. Tucker qualified for over \$13 million and received the first payment in the summer of 2021. Already, we have partnered again with NETWorks for the distribution of over \$1 million to our residents to help come out from the financial burden of a lingering pandemic. As we go forward, we'll call on our Friends of the Parks (and Trails) groups for advice, and we'll seek help from our expert residents on topics like broadband. As always, we're grateful to our churches for standing in the gap, meeting so many human needs for families and individuals.

All this, and so many more examples, are front of mind for me right now as we approach our Tucker Day Celebration



(which is also run by volunteers). As we celebrate our community, we are celebrating the "Tucker Way" and the fact that we are so closely linked together. We have so much to share with each other! No one has to volunteer, and if they do, it doesn't have to be in a public way. But when you do, life is so much richer for you and for the people you reach. Feeling connected to your community removes the fear and mystery and frustration about what's going on around you. It opens doors to things others are experiencing that can add to your enjoyment of your world, and may even remind you of all the goodness in your own life, even when you might not have been realizing it in the midst of your own difficulties.

So please, do yourself and all of us a favor, and join in! There are endless ways, and you can find some of them on our community calendar and our resource pages at tuckerga.gov/calendar and tuckerga.gov/volunteer. See you on Main Street!

FRANK AUMAN MAYOR



The Mayor and Council started April business with a special called meeting on April 11 for the purposes of executive session that resulted in no action taken. This was then followed by the regular scheduled meeting.

Council was presented with two staff reports. The first report was on the initial draft of the Fiscal Year '23 budget. Council is expected to vote on the budget June 13. The second report was from the city engineer on various capital projects.

Business continued with a scheduled second read and public hearing for a Special Land Use Permit (SLUP) to allow a mixed-use, multi-family development on Northlake Parkway. To allow the applicant to have further discussion of the proposed requests and conditions, staff recommended a deferral and Council voted 6-1 to defer the project until May 9. The Council then heard a second read and held public hearings for a pair of rezonings at 1220 and 1250 Richardson Street. Staff recommended both be deferred to allow time to complete the required improvements to the property before moving forward with the rezoning. Council voted unanimously for the deferral. Council also had a unanimous vote to extend the moratorium on the acceptance and processing of light industrial parcels.

This was followed by a first read and public hearing of an ordinance to amend the Fiscal Year '22 budget. Council was then presented with three contract approvals: one for the Hugh Howell Road Multi-Use Trail Project, one for the Cooledge Road Sidewalk Project and another for Field 3 Bathroom/Dugout Improvements at Fitzgerald Field. All three were approved by the Council unanimously.

During this meeting the Council confirmed the Mayor's reappointment of three Construction Board of Appeals members. The Construction Board of Appeals hears appeals of decisions and interpretations of the building official and considers variances from the technical codes. It consists of three members.

Later in the month the Mayor and City Council held two meetings on April 25. The first was a special called meeting that went directly into Executive Session. No action was taken and the meeting was adjourned. A work session followed with the second draft of the Fiscal Year '23 being the sole item for discussion.

As the budget process is a lengthy one, the Mayor and Council decided to suspend discussion and reconvene on May 2 at 7 p.m. to continue the Fiscal Year '23 budget discussion.

WELCOME HOME New initiative combines the resources of the city with hard work of its volunteers

"Tucker Welcomes You Home". That has a nice ring to it, doesn't it? It is the name of a new initiative coordinated by the Tucker Lifelong Community, a committee of the Tucker Civic Association in partnership with the City of Tucker. In 2019 the City went through a branding process. Residents knew what made Tucker the best in city in Georgia, but city staff needed help sharing it outside the City. Branding isn't just a logo or an image, it is the story of our community and how it is told. After months of community input and a special citizen committee, we were thrilled to unveil our Welcome Home logo featuring a community within a heart.

City staff wanted to share Tucker's story and community with new residents especially, so a plan was created and launched in early 2020. Based on monthly house closings within the Tucker city boundaries, a welcome postcard would be sent to the newest neighbors inviting them to come by City Hall and pick up a Welcome Home package. A reusable shopping bag was waiting to be picked up, stuffed with a rotating selection of city branded items like a t-shirt, stainless steel travel tumbler. reusable white boards and more, all branded with the community within a heart.

But then COVID happened. As people sequestered to their respective homes to keep the community safe and healthy, the Welcome Home program screeched to a halt. City Hall went through periods of being closed to the public, City Council meetings continued but via Zoom, Main Street was quiet with the absence of the traditional street festivals and celebrations.

As people sequestered in their homes, many expressed their restlessness by moving. Sales skyrocketed leading to a shortage of available homes which translated to a significant increase in home values and prices. Tucker became a hotspot and buyers have had to compete to purchase a home and become Tucker residents.


In response to the number of new residents, Tucker Civic Association's Lifelong Community committee discussed creating a welcome initiative. Remember the old "Welcome Wagon"? This is the same thought. Leaders reached out to the City to see if there was an opportunity to partner and "Tucker Welcomes You Home" was launched. Volunteers will go out and welcome new neighbors in person with a reusable shopping bag filled with information about Tucker and some City branded items to make them feel at home.

Just when you think you know Tucker, another hidden gem emerges. Such is the case with Turknett Leadership

Group, or TLG. They may be unknown to many locals, but they have gained the attention of the wider business world.

The husband-and-wife team Bob and Lyn Turknett, business partners and University of Georgia graduates, were named to the prestigious UGA Bulldog 100 list for 2022. The UGA Bulldog 100 award recognizes 100 UGA alum-run companies deemed the fastest-growing businesses as determined by their compounded annual growth rates during a three-year period.

"We had wanted this one for a long time," said Bob. "It means so much to be recognized for your accomplishments by your peers."

"We've received other awards over the years, but this one is particularly special to us because it came from our alma mater," added Lyn.

The pair met in college and moved from Athens to metro Atlanta in 1979 to raise a family. They settled in Tucker and created the business. Over the past 35 years, Bob and Lyn Turknett have quietly built and nurtured their award-winning company.

The couple worked adjacent to one another in their respective disciplines for many years before establishing Turknett.

"I always had to dream of actually working together, putting our disciplines together and doing something as a couple together, because she's so smart," said Bob. "We sort of dabbled in leadership and organization development but were really interested in doing more in that area."

In 1987, through a happenstance encounter with a consulting psychologist

at an Atlanta American Psychological Association, the opportunity presented itself for them to take the business to that next level.

Despite seemingly endless computer challenges, technical snafus, and software setbacks, they eventually developed their own brand of assessment and feedback business curriculum into what is now commonly known as leadership or executive coaching.

"We still had a challenge ahead of us," said Lyn, "As a new and untested field back in those days, it took some convincing to get potential clients to see the value of service."

Eventually they reeled in big clients such as BellSouth (now AT&T) where they provided executive leadership coaching services throughout the 2000s until a few years ago.

They have significantly broadened the service offerings over the years, "but still the number one thing we do is coaching C-suite executives, coaching high potentials, coaching key leaders that have a blind spot to some of their behavior and how it impacts their team or coworkers," said Lyn. "The coaching typically takes place over an eight to 12-month timeframe, and the methods used are all built around proven behavioral science."

Bob and Lyn credit a significant amount of their award-winning accelerated growth

rate to TLG's President and CEO Tino Mantella. Mantella, their hand-picked choice for CEO, was named as a 2022 Georgia Titan 100.

"We had been watching his career for a while before we reached out to him. He had a great track record of leading and growing with some well-respected organizations like the YMCA and [Technology Association of Georgia]," said Bob.

Mantella brought strategic vision and a diverse portfolio of experience of leadership in multiple industries and in for-profit and non-profit organizations including two of the world's largest YMCA systems, Metropolitan Chicago and Greater New York. Before joining TLG, he was head of the largest TAG, the leading technology industry association in the state, where he spearheaded the growth of its membership from 350 to 36,000.

The Titan 100 honor recognizes his body of work over his many years of experience as one of the area's most accomplished business leaders in his industry demonstrating exceptional leadership, vision and passion.


"What makes this honor special for me is that it recognizes my career more than a specific thing that I've done at a specific job," Mantella said. "For me, it's recognition of the people I brought together and the impact I've been able to have."

Those who have been around Tucker for a while may remember that the TLG offices used to be in a Northlake office complex. Their main office is now located in the Crescent Centre office complex.

They all agree that they are happy being in Tucker.

"We don't have any plans to leave. It's nice here, we like it, and it's convenient for everybody," said Mantella.


