Always make sure to check our social media channels for more up to date posts and information.



From the Mayor

I often use this column to go back and revisit our messaging and the goals of the 2013-2016 effort to incorporate Tucker. It's important to note how much thought was put into the startup of the City and how we as a community have benefitted. The City Charter is what we all voted on and approved as the basis for our authority and responsibilities. I reiterate this because in about a month, we are asking our community to approve a change to our charter that will allow us to take direct responsibility for a critical city service.

Our charter includes numerous checks and balances to ensure our elected officials do their jobs responsibly on behalf of our citizens. Tucker was initially charged with providing three essential services. Importantly, the charter also allows our citizens to authorize the city to take on additional services whenever we believe we can do so more effectively or cost efficiently. When we identify such an opportunity, the Mayor and Council are to call for a city-wide referendum to get approval from the voters. And that's what we've done by calling for a referendum about Public Works on the November ballot.

Another safeguard we built into the charter is a significant restriction on our ability to raise the tax rate. Currently, the Mayor and Council of Tucker can only tax property up to a total of 1 mill. Our rate was Zero until we assumed responsibility for Tucker's park system. At that time, we enacted a tax of 0.9 mills, which was accompanied by an identical decrease in the county tax rate. I think we can all agree that's been a very successful change, resulting in a much higher level of service in our Parks and Recreation Department. In fact, due to responsible management and diligent oversight, this year we were actually able to reduce that rate slightly!

The question on this ballot represents another opportunity to control our own destiny and provide a much-improved level of service. It's actually two questions: Shall we provide the listed services directly in the City of Tucker, and are we authorized to collect property taxes and fees to pay for them? Note that again DeKalb County would cease collecting taxes and fees for these services. A few page turns away is the actual question on the ballot and



our full Frequently Asked Questions that covers just about everything you need to know. We also have a dedicated page on our website with in-depth information. We also mailed a postcard to all residents inviting you to three informational meetings. Our first one was well attended, and I am looking forward to seeing many of our friends and neighbors at the two upcoming meetings.

It is imperative that our citizenry comes out and votes their will. A no vote would leave us to continue accepting the current level of service from our partners at DeKalb County. A yes vote allows us to forge ahead with a higher level of service and more direct accountability to our residents. Be aware this question is the very last item on the ballot, so please - whoever and whatever else you vote on, please go all the way to the end, and cast your vote on this important item!

City Council Update



September's regular scheduled meeting had a full agenda and started with six items on the consent agenda:

- Meeting Minutes for the two August meetings and the special called on September 1
- · 2022 GOSP Grant Agreement
- · August Financial report
- And the second for a text amendment concerning municipal court

The three items listed for Old Business were all second reads with public hearings and were approved by the Mayor and Council with 6-0 votes. These include:

- Amendment to the Tucker Code Chapter 10 Businesses relating to coin operated amusement devices, promotions, and lotteries
- Amendment to the Tucker Code
 Chapter 10 Businesses to provide
 for the mandatory use of video
 surveillance systems at convenience
 stores, and for other purposes
- Amendment to the Tucker Code Chapter 46 Zoning Ordinance including revising Article 6 to add regulations

for pervious pavement systems and revising Article 9 to add a definition for pervious pavement systems

New business included a first read and public hearing for the purpose of amending the Tucker Code Chapter 4 Alcoholic Beverages relating to event permitting for alcoholic beverage catered functions open to the public and other purposes. This was followed by a quick succession of contract approvals and change orders.

The second meeting of the month is typically a work session and an opportunity to hear about upcoming and ongoing plans. This month there was a special called meeting prior to the work session where Mayor and Council approved a contract agreement with Heath and Lineback Engineers for the Tucker-Northlake Trail Design with a 6-0 vote and also a text amendment to the Tucker Code Chapter 4 Alcoholic Beverages discussed at the first meeting of the month. This also was approved with a 6-0 vote.

ON THE BEAT with Lt. Berg

For this month's On The Beat, I've asked Sgt. Howard Jenkins to write something about our PALS unit and a great fundraising event we have coming up at our headquarters in Tucker.

Since 2006, the Dekalb County Police Department has operated the Dekalb County Police Athletic League Plus to aid in the prevention of juvenile crime by providing mentorship, civic service, athletic, recreational, enrichment and educational opportunities and resources to Dekalb County children. The Dekalb County PAL PLUS organization conducts a youth Career

Development Program, an After Dark Summer Basketball League, a dance team, a boxing program along with hosting community events and festivals for Dekalb County youth. Based at Dekalb County Police Headquarters in Tucker, Dekalb County PAL bridges the gap between law enforcement and the community through youth engagement programs. As a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, Dekalb PAL Plus raises 100% of its budget to go directly to programs that support youth programs that provide essential out-of-school activities for young people most in need.

Specifically in Tucker, Dekalb PAL Plus has a deep partnership with Tucker High School offering a four-month career development program (CDP) for young people ages 15-19. CDP helps prepare these young people for after-school jobs

and future careers through a series of life skills workshops that cover conflict resolution, financial literacy, interview skills, coping with trauma as well as technical college programs like welding and HVAC. Dekalb County police officers help program participants obtain their GEDs and get enrolled in Georgia Piedmont Technical College to lead to high paying practical vocational careers.

Additionally, DeKalb PAL Plus has taken hundreds of Dekalb County elementary school children to the movies at the local Tucker Movie Tavern through its "Movies with a Cop" program. This fun and engaging event gives children an opportunity to

experience police officers in a fun and engaging way that builds relationships and trust. DeKalb PAL Plus is currently working on a mentorship program for teenage boys in partnership with Tucker Middle School. All these programs are paid for through charitable donations and sponsorships, many coming directly from Tucker businesses and civic organizations.



One of their upcoming community-wide programs is coming up on Saturday, October 22, 4:00pm at the PAL Pumpkin 5K Run/Walk. Tucker residents have an opportunity to have fun and support DeKalb PAL Plus directly. The 5K Race is an event to raise awareness for the Dekalb PAL Plus program and to raise money for its youth mentoring program. All participants will receive a signature t-shirt and medal. In addition to the 5K run/walk, after the race we will have several family-friendly free activities.

Dekalb County PAL Plus is honored to be based in Tucker and have many of its efforts going directly to support Tucker youth. Together we can partner to reduce juvenile crime by mentoring Dekalb County youth with love and an empathetic approach. Please use your cell

RUTH FRUIT

We would like to nominate our mother, Ruth Fruit, for Tucker Citizen of the Month.

We can't think of anyone that loves and supports and is prouder of Tucker than our mom. There's good reason for her pride: our Tucker family roots date back to 1820 and she's lived through the changes of this community since she moved here in 1956. More personally, she has directly or indirectly touched the lives of thousands of Tucker citizens through her 32 years as an educator in Tucker schools.

Ruth Fruit was the Lead Teacher (a position now known as Assistant Principal) at Brockett Elementary then served as Principal of Livsey Elementary. She later moved to be Principal at Smoke Rise Elementary. After her service at Smoke Rise, she was appointed Area Director for Dekalb County Schools with oversight of 12 schools. Mom's love of education, children, and working with teachers and parents was evident in her motto, "Education With a Hug." She retired in 1995 to care for her mother.

Many Tucker residents may have met Mom during Little League baseball or softball on our backyard ball field on Idlewood Road. Others remember her many years of teaching adult Sunday School or serving on the Finance Committee at Atlanta First Methodist Church.

Mom has worked tirelessly over the years to do everything she can to make Tucker a great place to live. She frequents and encourages support of Tucker small businesses. She was an avid supporter of Tucker's city status initiative and Mom actively participates in her Homeowners' Association in the Browning Chase subdivision (which was named for one of our ancestors, Andrew Browning). In recent years she has led the effort to rejuvenate the New Fellowship Cemetery on Fellowship Road.

Through her example, Mom taught us the importance of a strong work ethic and kindness to others. Every day, she continues to be a role model for her two daughters, five grandchildren, and five great grandchildren. Mom celebrates her 90th birthday on October 16. I often think what a wonderful place the

world would be if there were more Ruth Fruits.

During the November 8 General Election, City of Tucker residents will have an opportunity to vote on a public works referendum that will transition current public works services from DeKalb County to the City of Tucker.

WHAT SERVICES ARE INCLUDED UNDER PUBLIC WORKS?

Public works services consist of two distinct functions: Roads & Maintenance and Stormwater services

IF THE PUBLIC WORKS REFERENDUM IS APPROVED DURING THE UPCOMING ELECTION, WHAT WOULD THE FINANCIAL COST BE TO A RESIDENT?

An average homeowner with a property valued at \$328,000 would see an increase of \$94 annually for roads and maintenance services and stormwater services combined.

- Roads & Maintenance Service Increase: \$70 a year for a home valued at \$328,000
- Stormwater Service Increase: \$24 a year for a home valued at \$328,000

IF THE PUBLIC WORKS REFERENDUM IS APPROVED DURING THE UPCOMING ELECTION, WHAT IS THE TIMELINE ASSOCIATED WITH THE CHANGE IN PUBLIC WORKS SERVICES?

If residents approve the transition of public works services from DeKalb County to the City of Tucker during the November referendum, the Tucker Public Works Department would officially launch on July 7, 2023.

IF THE PUBLIC WORKS REFERENDUM IS NOT APPROVED DURING THE UPCOMING ELECTION, WHAT HAPPENS TO PUBLIC WORKS SERVICES IN THE CITY OF TUCKER?

Nothing changes. DeKalb County will continue to maintain all public works services. Additionally, all emergency public works issues will continue to be managed by DeKalb County.

WHAT WILL THE CITY OF TUCKER'S INITIAL OBJECTIVES BE IF IT LAUNCHES ITS OWN PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT?

 and key repair needs. Additional public works assessments will take place to determine critical needs and capital project

Transition of Public Works Services From DeKalb County to City of Tucker

WHAT IS A "MILL" AS REFERENCED IN THE REFERENDUM AND HOW DOES IT IMPACT MY PROPERTY TAXES?

A mill is the rate at which property owners are assessed property taxes on the taxable value of their property (40% of assessed value). I mill = \$7 per \$7,000 of taxable value



No. Similar to when Parks and Recreations services were transferred to the City, residents will no longer pay DeKalb County for the management of Public Works services.





WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN WATER AND SEWER SERVICES AND STORMWATER SERVICES? WILL THIS REFERENDUM ADDRESS THE COUNTY'S WATER/SEWER SERVICES?

Stormwater facilities address the impact of rain and runoff to City streets. Water and sewer services involve treated water delivered to your home or businesses and waste that leaves them.

The public works services outlined do not include water and sewer related services. Those services will continue to be provided by DeKalb County.

BUSINESS OF THE MONTH

SIGGERS HAIRDRESSERS



John Siggers trained with the best in Atlanta back in 1960 with Styles by Styles, a premier beauty salon run by Styles Adamson. John spent his learning years with recognizable names like Jameson and Don Shaw whose friendships have lasted a lifetime, but John is the only one working 80 hours and still cutting hair. Hair has been a true passion for John and his family, inspired by his mother. Eucal Siggers started shampooing friends' hair out of her home in Alabama in 1938. She eventually opened her own shop and brought up many stylists during her working years, including John and his wife Carol. Under the guidance of Eucal, John and Carol traveled the world representing the United States in international styling competitions. In both 1962 and 1963, John was named United States Hairdresser of the Year.

John and Carol opened their first salon, John's Coiffures, when North DeKalb Mall launched in 1965. John and Carol soon realized that they would prefer to own their property rather than rent and bought the current building in Tucker in 1980. They were drawn to relocate to Tucker because by this time he and his wife had moved to the Smoke Rise neighborhood and their son Chad was attending school in Tucker. When the move was complete, they rebranded the salon Siggers Hairdressers.

In Georgia a beautician has two options to train for the certification: beauty school or apprenticeship. Siggers has based their business model on apprenticeship and that has

greatly added to their success and their staying power. "Having a trained and ready pool of stylists to promote as we grew just made sense," said John as he sat in the sun-filled break room.

John and Carol's son Chad and his wife Amy have been part of the stylist team and leadership for years as well. Chad added, "Mom and Dad have been good to the business and the business has been good to them," referring to their long list of loyal clients. In addition to having clients that have traveled to Tucker from around the southeast for decades, many stylists have remained for decades as well, "Helen Wilson, we all call her Grandma, has been cutting hair with us for over fifty years and has an incredibly loyal client base,".

Every year Mayor Frank Auman selects a Tucker business to receive the annual Mayor's Business Award. This was started back in 2018 as a way to recognize and thank long-standing local businesses. The past four recipients were Local No. 7, Cofer Brothers, FODAC and Northlake. This year the Mayor would like to honor Siggers Hair Dressers for their longevity and service to not only Tucker but the Southeast. The Mayor and Council will present John, Carol, Chad, Amy and their staff with the 2022 Mayor's Business Award later this month at the salon. 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BUSINESS BOOM

Georgia is consistently ranked in the "Top States for Doing Business", taking the #1 spot eight

years in a row from 2013 – 2021 by Area Development Magazine. What is it exactly about Georgia that is so advantageous for businesses, and how can existing Tucker businesses be sure that they are accessing programs they are eligible for?

For mega projects such as the recent landing of Rivian, an electric car manufacturer which announced a \$5B manufacturing plant that will cross Morgan and Walton counties and bring 7,500 jobs, the State of Georgia Economic Development Department (GDEcD) acts as the dedicated recruitment arm. Recruitment includes connecting these large employers to incentives such as job tax credits and full training programs such as Georgia Quick Start.

While there are specific GDEcD programs for mega projects that create thousands of new jobs, business incentives and programs benefit businesses of all sizes, including small businesses. Tax credits vary by a tier system that is established by the State annually and determined by need levels. The State's programs are designed to assist and encourage the growth of targeted industries, including manufacturing, warehousing, distribution, logistics, software development and fintech, telecommunication, research, and development.

For small business owners and entrepreneurs in Georgia, there are dedicated programs that have also been created to provide support, regardless of industry. Through its 18 locations across the state, the University of Georgia Small Business Development Center



(UGA SBDC) provides a wide range of educational and training services for small businesses, including confidential no-cost, one-on-one professional consulting. For Tucker residents and businesses, you can take advantage of DeKalb's Small Business Development Center located just outside of Tucker's city limits.

The UGA SBDC has a simple mission "to enhance the economic well-being of Georgians by providing a wide range of educational services for small business owners and aspiring entrepreneurs", says Candice Mays, SBDC Business Consultant, which makes sense since according to the US Small Business Administration, 99.6% of all Georgia businesses and nearly 43% of all Georgia employees are from small businesses.

Candice describes that the services provided by the UGA SBDC aim to, "offer tools, training, and resources to help small businesses grow and succeed. We help for-profit business owners across

the five core business areas - strategic planning, marketing, human resources management, financial reporting, and operational excellence." Businesses often visit the DeKalb UGA SBDC office looking for assistance with how to start their business or are experiencing slowed sales and are hoping to find ways to turn things around. Candice shares that, "every business owner's situation is different. Helping them start or manage their businesses more effectively could be a matter of reviewing their finances, or conducting a website and social media analysis, or even helping them prepare for loan approval". Other examples of business support the UGA SBDC provides are strategic planning, market research, assistance in loan applications, and lowcost continuing education courses which are available online.

Candice gains her experience from her private sector background leading brand strategy for a portfolio of animal health products focusing on branding, go-to-market strategy and implementation.


