

I have served with some amazingly dedicated fellow council members to make sure that our government leads responsibly in the Tucker Way. And I am grateful.


I have seen our budget and our services grow in a smart fiscal manner to provide improved and expanded services. And I am grateful.

TUCKER RESIDENT AL LIPPHARDT NAMED VFW COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF

Alfred J. "Al" Lipphardt was elected Commander-in-Chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the U.S. on Aug. 1, 2024, at the 125th VFW National Convention in Louisville, Kentucky.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) was born out of a need to advocate for rights and benefits for veterans of the Spanish-American War and Philippine Insurrection in the late 1800s. In the 125 years since inception the VFW has advocated for countless measures including the establishment of the Veterans Administration, compensation for veterans of Vietnam and the Gulf War and the expansion of the Gl Bill. Their Mission and Vision define their purpose and what the seek to accomplish through their advocacy and memorial efforts.

Al, a resident of Tucker, served in the United States Army from 1965 to 1979, earning his VFW eligibility by serving in Vietnam from 1967 to 1968, and from 1970 to 1971. In recognition of his heroic service in combat, he received the Combat Infantryman's Badge, Bronze Star with "V" device, Bronze Star Medal for Meritorious Service, Purple Heart Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal with Silver Star and two Bronze Stars, Vietnam Service Medal, Vietnam Cross of Gallantry with Palm Medal, and the Vietnam Staff Service Medal First Class.

He joined the VFW in 2002 at Post 12002 in North Fulton, Georgia, as a Charter member and maintains his Gold Legacy Life membership in VFW Post 2667, Newnan, Georgia, along with his family members who are also VFW Department of Georgia Auxiliary Post 2667 Life members. He has served in elected and appointed positions at the Post, District and Department levels, culminating with his election as the VFW Department of Georgia Commander. Al is a Triple Crown All-American

On the national level, he has served as Vice Chairman of the National Legislative Committee, a member of the National Veterans Service Advisory Committee, a member of the National Security and Foreign Affairs Committee, National Council of Administration and numerous other critical National Committees.

Al received his Bachelor of Science degree in business administration from Pacific Western University in 1990. He is retired.

He is a member of the Rotary Club of Stone Mountain, Georgia. A Rotarian since 1984, his distinguished service has been recognized by Rotary International with the Service Above Self Award and the Rotary Foundation's Citation for Meritorious Service Award. He was elected and served as an officer of Rotary International as District 6900 Governor, from 1999 to 2000, and has chaired critical national and international committees.

Al's lifelong devotion to servant leadership is evidenced by his life membership in the Disabled American Veterans, Military Order of the Purple Heart, the VFW National Home, Military Order of the Cootie, the 196th Light Infantry Brigade Association, the American Division Veterans Association, and the United States Army Officer Candidate School Alumni Association (Hall of Fame inductee).

It is easy to see why Al was appointed as Commander-in-Chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Through his lifelong dedication to his country and those that served alongside him, Al is a proven leader that Tucker can be proud of.

REBUILDING THE AMERICAN LEGION

The American Legion is a national organization with posts throughout the country to serve local veterans and provide resources and camaraderie. Tucker's Post 207 tragically burned to the ground a few years ago and they are in the midst of a capital drive to rebuild the post that has served both local and visiting veterans since 1957.

WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

Veterans Day is intended to thank and honor all those who served honorably in the military – living and dead – whether in wartime or peace. In fact, Veterans Day is largely intended to thank living Veterans for their service, to acknowledge that their contributions to our national security are appreciated, and to underscore the fact that all those who serve have sacrificed and done their duty.

While Veterans Day is often confused with Memorial Day, the two observances serve different purposes and have different histories. Memorial Day, which has its roots in the post-Civil War effort to "memorialize" all those who died in that war, has become a modern holiday to remember those from all wars and conflicts who gave their lives in service to the country. In December 2000 the U.S. Congress passed and the President signed into law "The National Moment of Remembrance Act" to "encourage the people of the United States to give something back to their country, which provides them so much freedom and opportunity" by encouraging and coordinating commemorations of Memorial Day and the National Moment of Remembrance.

Veterans Day, however, was first known as Armistice Day as a celebration of the resolution of World War I, a peace recognized historically on the date and time of that event, November 11, 1918, at 11:00 a.m., and salutes surviving service members as well as those who have passed away since their service.

CITY HALL UPDATE

CITY COUNCIL UPDATE

The Mayor called the October 15 City Council Meeting to order with all seven City Council members present.

The Mayor celebrated the Tucker Parks & Recreation Department's four Georgia Recreation and Parks Association (GRPA) District Awards and commended the Public Works Department for their work leading up to and during Hurricane Helene.

Mayor Auman motioned to add item J.4 to the agenda regarding the City's contract for vehicle leasing and made a separate motion to remove item G.5, a resolution to submit a 2024-25 Land Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) pre-application, from the consent agenda for further consideration as item J.5. The approved consent agenda contained:

- · September's meeting minutes
- · A resolution to adopt the 2025 calendar
- A resolution to amend the Tucker Development Authority FY 25 budget
- A contract task order for stormwater maintenance at 2452 Spencers Way
- A contract amendment for the Tucker Town Green Design

Next, Candace Amos, Senior Health and Financial Wellness Consultant from the Government Municipal Association (GMA), presented the City's Wellness Committee with a 2024 Health Promotion and Wellbeing Grant for \$3,000 to support wellness activities. Tommy Hayes, MSI Benefits Group Benefits Consultant, introduced the City's 2025 Health Insurance Benefits Renewal.

Ordinances which saw their second read and public hearing include:

- A major modification to allow a place of worship at 6430 Lawrenceville Highway, passed unanimously
- A 12-month time extension for a previously approved special land use permit (SLUP) for multifamily housing at 2247 and 2251 Northlake Parkway, passed unanimously
- A Tucker Code amendment affecting
 the downtown special zoning districts to
 increase permitted multifamily density
 in DT-2 and DT-3 from 24 to 35 units per
 acre and allow a SLUP process to request
 higher density, allow a SLUP process by
 which property owners and developers may
 request one additional story of height, and
 other changes to townhome width and lot
 coverage, passed 5-2
- A Tucker Code amendment to create procedures that property owners can follow to request special districts for modifying streetlighting, passed unanimously
- A purchasing policy amendment to increase City Manager approval limit, increase the formal sealed bids threshold, clarify use of "on-call" contract and task orders and add a section for change orders and contract amendments, passed unanimously

The evening's proceedings also included the first read and public hearing of a SLUP to allow a multifamily use abutting a residential zoning district with a concurrent variance for exterior building materials at 4419 Cowan Road.

The Mayor and City Council unanimously approved a contract amendment and a contract award:

- An amendment for the Fitzgerald Park Phase 2 Improvements, bringing the initial \$4,341,298.78 approved to a total of \$4,434,212.81
- An award to North Georgia Concrete for the Johns Homestead Park and Dam Improvement Construction Project in the amount of \$3,817,263 with a 5% contingency, bringing the total to \$4,008,126.15 partially funded by a 2022 Georgia Outdoor Stewardship Program grant for \$2,521,787.65

The City also unanimously approved item J.4, a resolution regarding the City's supplemental vehicle leasing.

The final item on the agenda was a resolution to submit a 2024-25 Land Water Conservation Fund pre-application, for which Parks and Recreation Director Rip Robertson requested commitment to match the grant funds to begin the pre-application process. This LWCF grant would allow the City to build two bridges along the Yellow Trail at Henderson Park. The Mayor and City Council approved the resolution unanimously. The Mayor and City Council recessed to executive session and adjourned the meeting with no further action taken.

Tucker's mayor and Council meet on the second and fourth Mondays of every month at City Hall. All meetings are live-streamed and recorded on the website, tuckerga.gov. Due to publication deadlines, please check the website for recaps of the second meeting of the month.


TUCKER TOWN GREEN BREAKS GROUND

The big news out of City Hall this month is all about green space.

As the Mayor said in the groundbreaking of the Tucker Town Green, this is the beginning of the end for this project that has taken years to get this point. Through partnership with local landowners in the sale of the property, with contracted partners like Barge Design, Hasbun Construction and our embedded staff with Lowe Engineering and Jacobs, we are excited to have broken ground and start construction

on one of the City's largest projects to date.

Railroad Avenue has been closed due to the construction from Second Avenue to the parking lot behind Local 7 and will be closed for the duration of the build.



Further news out of Parks and Recreation is a community meeting at Tucker Recreation Center on November 7 at 7 p.m. regarding the proposed pickleball courts and expanded

parking at TRC. This meeting bookends the discussion on the project from the first public input meeting in November of 2022.


Pickleball has been the fastest growing sport for almost a decade and the demand is ever increasing.

Shapiro learned his best chance to wrestle during his senior year would be to forgo surgery and commit to a chiropractic treatment protocol. Shapiro fully recovered and was able to compete. That season, he won his division and went on to wrestle throughout his college career.

Complete Spine Solutions attempts to be intentional about building a healthy community, in Tucker and beyond. The office offers free consultations for children 12 years old and under every Thursday and on Wednesdays they offer free workshops to the community to education on ways to become healthier.

To further that goal, Shapiro pours into his staff to make sure they are fully trained and educated in all aspects of chiropractic therapy and healthy living,

"Every single person that works on our team are all inspired leaders," Shapiro said. "They help other people become leader and empower them with their health."

Shapiro said the purpose of his facility is to help patients live their best lives. Doing so brings a smile to the former wrestler turned chiropractor.


