



you this season to find ways to show your appreciation for others and for each one's special place in our community. CITY HALL UPDATE

CITY COUNCIL UPDATE

The City of Tucker offices were closed on November 11 in observance of Veterans Day so the regularly scheduled City Council meeting was held on Tuesday November 12 at Tucker City Hall.

Mayor Frank Auman participated via Zoom as a councilmember and ceded the meeting to Mayor Pro-Tem Cara Schroeder. After unanimously approving the evening's agenda and the consent agenda, the Council then heard three presentations. The City was pleased to host the presentation of the Georgia Recreation and Parks Association's Volunteer of the Year to the Friends of Tucker Parks group. Made up of 75 plus dedicated people, the Friends of Tucker Parks groups have been invaluable partners with the City of Tucker with their time, talent and sweat equity.

DeKalb County Watershed presented the upcoming project of installing pump stations and reversing the flow that currently goes from DeKalb to Gwinnett to remain in Gwinnett. The County is seeking an easement from the City of Tucker to build one of the pump stations in Henderson Park.

TSW then provided an update on the City Standards Guidebooks that City staff will use when designing projects on public land. The Council was able to provide feedback on options for gateway signage and wayfinding signs.

The presentations were followed by a second read and public hearing of a Special Land Use Permit application to allow a multi-family use abutting a residential zoning district and a concurrent variance. The Council then motioned and voted 5-2 to defer the application to the December 9, 2024 meeting for the opportunity to meet with the owner and learn more about the plan.

The Mayor and Council then had a first read and public hearing for a rezoning application to allow the parking of commercial vehicles and outdoor storage on Hammerhill Road. Another first read was of an ordinance to amend the Tucker Code Chapter 40 to provide for certain procedures relating to community redevelopment tax incentives.

The last item of business for the evening was a contract amendment with Atlas Technical Consultants for the stormwater inventory and assessment for an additional \$127,674. The Council voted unanimously to approve the amendment.

The City of Tucker's Mayor and Council meet the second and fourth Mondays of each month at City Hall, 1975 Lakeside Parkway, 350B, Tucker, GA 30084. All meeting agendas and streamed meetings can be found at tuckerga.gov.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN

The City of Tucker has a robust budget process that starts in February and is finalized in June each year. The fiscal year budget is for the operating budget and addresses the day to day spending to keep our government working.

A Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) is a long-term strategy that outlines an organization's planned investments in infrastructure, facilities, and other capital assets over a period of 5 to 10 years. The CIP prioritizes projects based on factors such as importance, feasibility, and alignment with the organization's goals, while also detailing anticipated costs, funding sources, timelines, and expected outcomes. The primary purpose of a CIP is to ensure the maintenance, upgrading, and expansion of infrastructure and assets in a way that supports future needs and operational efficiency, without overburdening the budget.

Local governments are encouraged to adopt comprehensive, fiscally sustainable, multi year capital plans to effectively manage their capital assets. Infrastructure, technology, and major equipment form the backbone of public services, so the procurement, design, construction, maintenance, and operation of these assets must be carefully planned and managed.

The City of Tucker has been developing a CIP dashboard for the Council, staff and community to track the larger scaled projects and identify funding needs. Once the set-up is complete it will be embedded on the City website, updated in real time and will be an exciting way to track projects. The software will also streamline the monthly financial reports and annual budget book.

DA FOODIE SPOT ATL

Da Foodie Spot ATL is a vibrant restaurant in Tucker, known for bringing a burst of flavors to the local community. Offering a variety of exciting options, from foodie boxes with wings and egg rolls to their refreshing Foodie Juice, Da Foodie Spot ATL delivers a jam-packed flavor experience.

"It has a lot of flavors," said Rashon Taylor, owner of Da Foodie Spot ATL. "Just some really good food. We make sure everything is fresh every day, and we want to keep giving people the best food we can offer."

Taylor explained that his restaurant specializes in fun foods that foodies love. His journey into creating unique culinary experiences began with his previous restaurant, where he learned to experiment with different flavors and understand what customers enjoy. Before Da Foodie Spot ATL, Taylor ran Stuffy Dawg ATL, a gourmet hotdog restaurant that opened in 2021. However, he discovered that hotdogs weren't as popular in Georgia as he had hoped.

FRIENDS OF TUCKER PARKS

Last month, the Friends of Tucker Parks organization received the Georgia Recreation and Parks Association's Volunteer of the Year award, announced at the state conference and presented at the Tucker Council meeting on November 12.

Founded in 2010 through a joint vision of multiple community groups, the Friends of Tucker Parks is a volunteer led 501c3 with a mission to preserve, protect and improve all parks located in Tucker, Georgia in partnership with the City of Tucker government. They are the umbrella or parent organization to the underlying "Friends of" groups for each park in the City. Together, they unify their voices in advocacy for all of Tucker's parkland, leverage state and local grant opportunities, and pour on the sweat equity.

Throughout the years and hundreds of volunteer hours, the Friends of Tucker Parks has made a positive impact on the City's parks while providing opportunities for service hours. The board members meet on a monthly basis with all the Tucker park "Friends of" groups and City staff to plan the bi-monthly cleanup days. This consistent and open collaboration has allowed for numerous successful projects including but not limited to:

- · Restoration projects at Johns Homestead Park
- · Created a Commemorative Park Amenity Program
- Supported other organizations in events like Tucker Day, River's Alive and the Great American Cleanup.

- The Master Gardeners care for the Native Plant and Wildlife Walk at Henderson Park


CONGRATULATIONS to Tucker Middle School and Livsey Elementary School for receiving Math Leader Awards from the Georgia Department of Education.
