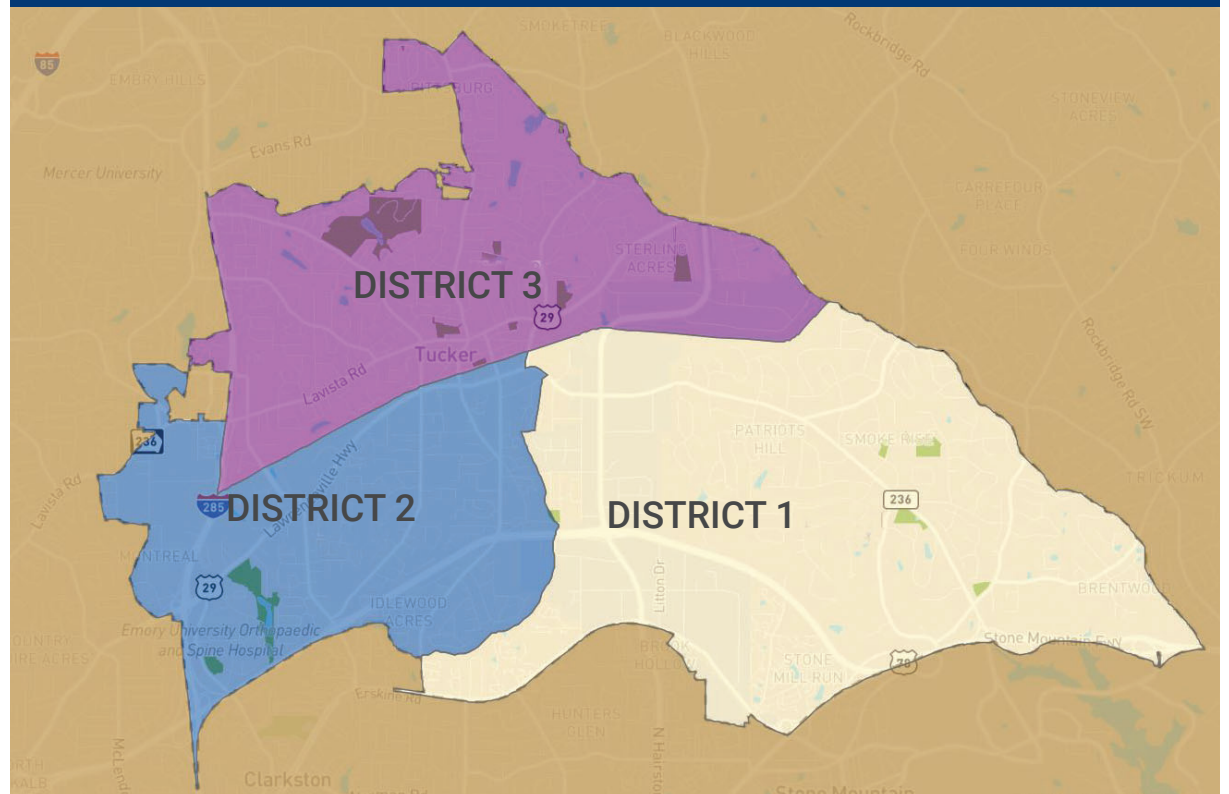

FEATURE STORY

THE ADDAMS FAMILY COMES TO TUCKER



This is not your average middle school play.

Unlike most middle school shows, TMS's cast is full of both experienced students and new performers bringing their talent to the stage. Their production standards are high. They work to ensure a high value entertainment experience, and they have even found the need to create VIP sections for their shows. Even though the cast members are middle school students, they conduct themselves professionally.

TMS productions are a big deal at the school and in the Tucker community. "It's not a middle school production for us," said TMS drama teacher and the show's director, Artanza Denson. "It is the Super Bowl for us."

The cast has worked on the show for months. The production team met in August to begin planning the show. This was followed by auditions in October, and since November, the cast has rehearsed dance routines with choreographer and

assistant director Lauren Tally. Cast members can be seen walking the halls of TMS with scripts in hand, studying their lines with color-coded tabs. Many even practiced during the winter break.

Several cast members have appeared in musicals such as *The Little Mermaid* and *The Lion King*. Some have even performed in Main Street Theatre productions.

Director Denson is impressed by the level of talent she sees and feels fortunate that the Tucker community helps nurture these young performers. "Our students are now auditioning to leave here to go to the DeKalb School of the Arts," Denson said. "We're getting some really good talent, and now they are choosing to pursue it a little bit further... Livsey has a theatre program, so now we're getting talent from one of the elementary schools."

In addition to talent, Denson is grateful for the strong community support the program

receives. There are always volunteers who help to construct sets during build days and prepare for performances. Local businesses support the department by hosting fundraising events.

Denson appreciates the parents of TMS students. They help with makeup and even provide meals for the students. In one instance, art director Brittany Ranew shared a sketch of her vision for set design with a parent, who listened and used his skills to create a 3D model rendering within hours. That same parent then connected the production team with the Cofer Brothers, and TMS now works with them for supplies.

"It would not be possible without the support," said Denson. "This community has embraced what we are doing."

Denson hopes that audiences will enjoy the show's dark humor and leave with a message about the importance of truth, family and love.

THIS ALUM JOSIAH LAWSON EXCELS ON AND OFF THE COURT



Same colors, same mascot, same confidence and the same signature roar.

Josiah Lawson still wears the same maroon and gold, represents the same mascot, and unleashes the same signature roar. From the hardwood courts of Tucker High School to Morehouse College, his journey has shifted locations without altering his identity. The former Tiger carries the spirit of Tucker wherever he goes. Although he now competes at the collegiate level, the image remains familiar: he plays with unshakable confidence and punctuates big plays with his trademark celebration, screaming with his arms flexed at his sides.

Lawson's love for the game ignited at a young age under the tutelage of his father, who trained both Josiah and his older brother, Asaad. Josiah credits those early sessions and the constant sibling rivalry for sharpening his competitive edge.

"The one-on-one games really helped my competitive edge," Lawson said. "He was always better than me. Just seeing him do the things he did just inspired me to be good. It was really great just having a workout partner, too, all these years."

The tables have turned recently, as the Morehouse sophomore joked that Asaad can no longer beat him in a matchup. The brothers previously shared the court at both Druid Hills and Tucker High School. Josiah's transition to Tucker after his freshman year was seamless, aided by deep roots in the local basketball community.

"It was great," Lawson said. "There were a lot of familiar faces on the team that I already played AAU with growing up. It was not like a new experience for me. I already had some comradery with the players there."

During his tenure at THS, Lawson became a local legend. He led the team to a regional championship and earned All-State honors for three consecutive years. By the time he graduated, he had amassed over 1,500 points and 700 rebounds, cementing his place as one of the top three scorers in school history and top

20 in DeKalb County history. His favorite memory remains the electric atmosphere of his sophomore year region title win, played before a sold-out home crowd.

"It was the greatest feeling especially winning and seeing all of the hard work paying off," Lawson said. "That was one of the top moments for me."

Beyond the court, Lawson excelled as a scholar. He utilized dual enrollment at Georgia State University during his junior and senior years to earn college credit while freeing up time for training. He finished high school with a staggering 4.5 GPA, balancing elite athleticism with academic rigor.

When it came time to choose a college, Lawson was a high-commodity recruit with offers from Harvard University, Yale, Princeton, and the University of Georgia. However, the choice was deeply personal. As a third-generation legacy student whose father and grandfather both attended Morehouse, the decision to head to the Morehouse was a "no-brainer." Joining the ranks of the Maroon Tigers was not just a basketball decision; it was a commitment to the lineage of "Morehouse Men" who came before him, ensuring the family name remains synonymous with the institution's prestigious history.

Now in his second season with the program, Lawson is hungry for more. After contributing valuable minutes as a true freshman, an injury forced him to redshirt. He has returned this season with a professional mindset and lofty ambitions: a NCAA Division II National Championship and individual honors as Conference Player of the Year and All-American.

Because of his early start with college credits, Lawson is on track to graduate next year with a degree in Computer Science while maintaining a perfect 4.0 GPA. His long-term blueprint is a calculated climb. He plans to graduate early, use his remaining eligibility to showcase his talents at the Division I level, and ultimately launch a professional career. Whether he is dominating the courts or mastering code, Josiah Lawson is building a future as storied as his family's past.

BUSINESS OF THE MONTH

ONPOINT INSTITUTE

After the birth of her second child, Sandra Thompson drifted in and out of consciousness. Everything felt like a blurred haze until a nurse entered the room to check her vitals. In her vulnerable state, Thompson heard the nurse say, 'This woman is sick.' She was immediately rushed to ICU. Following her recovery, Thompson felt a profound sense of gratitude for the nurse who took decisive action. That "angel" became her inspiration, sparking a journey into the medical field that eventually led Thompson to establish the OnPoint Institute, an organization dedicated to preparing individuals for careers in nursing.

"We are a non-profit community based educational organization," Thompson said. "So what we do is we provide several services for those who are underserved."

The institute offers an extensive range of medical training and certifications, including Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) and Certified Medical Assistant (CMA) programs, phlebotomy, caregiver training, and CPR certification. As executive director and owner, Thompson ensures that financial barriers never prevent a student from learning.

"If we don't have grants for you, we offer discounts and do everything we can to help," Thompson said. "We don't ever turn anyone away."

Thompson's dedication is rooted in her own history. She grew up in a New York neighborhood struggling with violence and drugs, where addicts frequently occupied the roof of her apartment building.

"It was so bad. It was gang infested and that kind of thing," Thompson said. "At this point we lived on the fifth floor that led to the roof. The drug addicts would sit on the roof and shoot up drugs."

To escape that environment, her mother moved the family to Georgia. Thompson began her career as a nursing assistant and was encouraged by a neighbor to pursue higher education. Though she initially struggled with the entrance exams, her determination never wavered.

"Originally I could not get into nursing school," Thompson said. "I could not pass the test to get into nursing school but I kept trying and trying."

Eventually, she entered nursing school, graduated, and began working as a Registered Nurse. This career shift brought her financial freedom, a luxury she realized when she was finally able to purchase a sweater she had once considered an impossible waste of money.

Through OnPoint Institute, Thompson helps others achieve that same independence.



She has been a nurse for over 30 years and continues to work in the field to fund the school, often investing her own savings to keep the doors open. Her reward is witnessing success stories like that of Rosa Amezcuita, who overcame a language barrier to graduate with the highest scores in her class.

"It feels wonderful because what I find is that many times we don't have the same opportunity as those that are of a lighter color," Thompson said.

Reflecting on her growth from an introverted girl in a difficult environment to the leader of an educational facility to the leader of an educational facility, Thompson remains humbled by her mission.

"My favorite part about all of this is being able to come into this facility and look at it and think about where I came from and to be honest with you, I just praise God because of where I came from and to have this is a blessing," Thompson said. Recently, she helped organize a fundraiser/alliance with Wine and Whimsies, a Tucker Main Street business, to help support the community.

WHAT HAPPENED AT THE LAST CITY COUNCIL MEETING?

JANUARY 2026 CITY COUNCIL RECAP

In a special called meeting the hour before the first Tucker City Council meeting of 2026, the ten-year-old City welcomed Mayor Anne Lerner in an official oath of office and a ceremonial passing of the gavel from Mayor Auman.

The oath of office was also administered to the three councilmembers that were re-elected for Seat 1 of each District. Councilmembers Roger Orlando (D1), Cara Schroeder (D2) and Alexis Weaver (D3) re-avowed their commitment to the City of Tucker surrounded by their families and warmly cheered by their community.

Following a small celebration the new mayor and council held their first meeting together as a Council.

The Tucker High School JROTC Color Guard presented the colors and led the room in the Pledge of Allegiance. The Council approved the agenda for the evening then elected District One Councilmember Virginia Rece to serve as Mayor Pro-Tempore in the event the Mayor is temporarily unable to serve.

As her first order of business as Mayor, Mayor Lerner introduced a resolution to declare the City of Tucker a certified "City of Civility" as recognized by the Georgia Municipal Association.

The consent agenda was then approved unanimously and contained the minutes from the December meeting, a resolution for an application for funding for the Greenway Connector, the same for the Tucker-Northlake Trail, an amendment to the pay structure to add seasonal part time

positions for the summer. The consent agenda also had two contract amendments for stormwater repairs and Richardson Street Construction.

Item J.1, an ordinance for a SLUP at 3892 Lavista Road was withdrawn by the applicant and the Council voted unanimously to accept the withdrawal.

Item J.2 was approved unanimously to allow for a massage establishment at 3983 Lavista Road.

Item K.1 passed unanimously for a contract with CSX Transportation for a preliminary engineering agreement for grader crossing at Brockett Road.

Item K.2 passed unanimously for a contract for stormwater repairs at four locations.

Item K.3 passed 6-1 for the amendment to the OPTECH contract for park maintenance.

Item K. 4 passed unanimously for a contract with LOWE for the preparation of bid documents, construction engineering and inspections services and testing for Rosenfeld park improvements.

Item K.5 passed unanimously an agreement with the Georgia Department of Transportation for construction funding at Hugh Howell Road and Mountain Industrial Boulevard.

The Mayor and Council then recessed for executive session with no action after.
